This book is fourth in the Legal Systems of Africa series, following THE LEGAL SYSTEM OF ETHIOPIA by K. Redden, published in 1968, AN INTRODUCTION TO LAW IN FRENCH-SPEAKING AFRICA: AFRICA SOUTH OF THE SAHARA, Volume I, by J. W. Salacuse, published in 1969, and THE LEGAL SYSTEM OF CONGO-KINSHASA by J. H. Crabb, published in 1970. Volumes on Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Nigeria, the Somali Republic, Sudan and Zambia are in preparation, as well as a second volume by J.W. Salacuse on French-speaking North Africa. The authors of the LEGAL SYSTEM OF LESOTHO have divided the book into sources of law, namely the common law, the customary law, and legislation; constitutional development from colonial days to the emergence in 1966 of the independent state; and the courts and the legal profession. The reader is alerted that the legal statements contained in this book are subject to a cutoff date of January 1, 1970 and that the 1966 Constitution has been suspended and a new one is not available at this time.
